The Greenway has followed that tradition by creating our own Point of Light Award to recognize individuals for their long term volunteerism to the Greenway.

I recently took advantage of a free lunch hour, sunny but cold weather, and a walking partner who walks as fast as I do (my wife, Melanie) and took a quick stroll from Sarg Hubbard to Sherman Park. That 40 minute walk brought back into clear focus what the Greenway means to this community. Like most of us, I get so wrapped up in day-to-day activities that I lose sight of where this organization is going and why.

In that short walk we observed five bald eagles perched above the icy Yakima River, looking for their own lunch. Three Great Blue Herons were seen in the shallows, also looking for a quick meal. pered up and down a huge cottonwood right next to the pathway.

2006 Washington State Trail Conference

The Washington State Trails Coalition held "Trails for Future Generations," their 2006 conference, in Yakima on November 3-4. Yakima Greenway Foundation staff were among those in attendance, including Jeff Brantner, who shares his perspective:

The Washington State Trail Conference was not only grand in numbers but especially in impact. With over 230 leaders representing all types of trails and their uses, plus a dozen state legislators present, the conference hit



the current issues facing trails in Washington and more importantly gave clear paths and targets for the future. Being an avid hiker, I am very concerned about the future of trails in our great state of Washington. What I found is that maintaining the current trails is now the focus. I also learned that what the Yakima Greenway Foundation has accomplished is the model for future success for new pathways and trails.

With many of the leading decision makers and representatives from trail and land trust organizations attending this conference, it was palpable that this group holds the Yakima Greenway Foundation in very high regard. This is due to the Greenway's unique history and the amount of civic and community effort it took to make this 3600-acre land trust a reality. It was with awe that other trail providers would ask about this linear parkway, which is maintained and supported by our local community.

Due to continual cutbacks and reduced budgets, the focus for most trails

organizations is to maintain an aging infrastructure. The Greenway has not only maintained its parks and pathways, it has also enhanced and will continue to grow. There are possibilities to connect with Cowiche Canyon Conservancy, the William O. Douglas trail, Naches, the east side of the Yakima River via the new SR24 bridge, and Selah. Though the Greenway must adhere to Federal, State and City laws and regulations, since it does not receive any tax support it is able to make decisions locally that are best for the Yakima Valley.

The Greenway is the model for the future. To keep parks and trails from being the first cut, communities need to rely on local leaders, service groups and volunteers to help maintain their local

assets as the Greenway has done and will continue to do.

Letter from a Visitor

The Yakima Greenway is a lovely combination of paved trail, connected parks, and land held in conservation running along the Naches and Yakima rivers. About 10 miles in length, with smooth pavement and very little elevation gain or loss, the trail is perfect for families and new cyclists. I particularly enjoyed riding along the curving pathway of the rivers in November, listening to the water move over smooth gray rocks, soaking in the golden glow of the cottonwoods, and knowing that I was escaping the rain pounding back home in Seattle.

Parks along or nearby the trail include:

- Sarg Hubbard Park: the jewel of the Yakima Greenway, with its amphitheatre & “dock stage” on the kids’ fishing pond, a children’s playground, a series of connected pathways, and the headquarters of the Yakima Greenway Foundation.
- McGuire Playground/Sunrise Rotary Park: a terrific wooden play structure built along the trail about a mile north of Sarg Hubbard Park.
- Sherman Park and the Yakima Area Arboretum, on the southeastern end of the trail (the Arboretum is its own entity, not part of the Greenway system).
- Chesterley Park, near the western end of the trail, which has a super-cool, kid-designed skate park, and which connects to a three-mile pathway built on top of a capped canal (Chesterley Park and the three-mile Powerhouse Path are City of Yakima Parks and not part of the Greenway system).

May through September, “courtesy cart” volunteers ride the trail in golf carts, offering water to thirsty walkers and cyclists, picking up litter, and helping with small emergencies.

Discover the warm (ok, in summer one might say hot!) hospitality of the Yakima Greenway for yourself and include this trail in a bike tour of the Yakima Valley. Several hotels are situated right along the trail, just north of Sarg Hubbard Park, and the Bike Yakima Map includes several wonderful cycling routes along low-traffic country roads. In spring and fall it will give you a dose of much-needed sunshine too.

Revolution Cycles, located near the western end of the trail at Fruitvale and 40th Ave., is a terrific bike shop (they really helped me out with a broken gear cable and 2 flats!) and because you’re traveling in goathead country you might need to pick up a spare tube (or 2)! (Goathead is a low-growing weed with 2 sharp thorns that punctures a lot of bike tires in Yakima.)

One problem with the Greenway Trail is access – access points are relatively few and hard to find. Check the Bike Yakima Map and ask locally, or park in Sarg Hubbard Park for the easiest-to-find trail entry point.

Alas, I was there in November, so I do not know where to find the best ice cream in Yakima... but I’ll bet one of the summer courtesy patrol volunteers will gladly guide you to it!

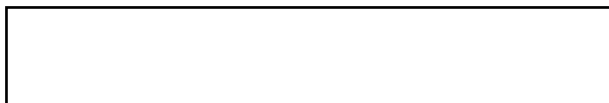
Construction News

In December, the Department of Transportation opened the pathway under the Highway 24 bridge construction project, re-connecting the pathway south. It currently has a temporary gravel surface. In mid-May, the pathway will once again be severed and re-routed to accommodate the removal of the old bridge and support pilings. It is anticipated that the pathway will then not be reopened until early fall of 2007.

In December, the Department of Transportation awarded bids for the reconstruction of the Hwy 12/Fruitvale/40th Avenue intersection. Included with that project will be the construction of a trail extension from the Greenway path around Myron Lake to 40th at Fruitvale. Expect to see work on this project begin in early spring and be completed by mid-year. This will provide Greenway users a way to access Chesterley Park, the Powerhouse Pathway and open opportunities to fill in a gap in the Wm. O. Douglas trail and link with the Cowiche Canyon.
